ancient egyptian tale of two brothers custom in fraternity hazing and ritual fasting and games in the modern greek game of long donkey one of two essays dundes coauthored with his daughter lauren dundes professor of sociology at western maryland college successfully probes the content of disney s the little mermaid yielding new insights into this popular reworking of a hans christian andersen
